Introduction

Easter is a season that lasts for 50 days. It begins with the celebration of Easter Sunday, and continues until the festival of Pentecost. The Easter Exultet reminds us that this is a time for all the earth to rejoice! We rejoice in the good news that God speaks the first and the last Word, and that Word is life. This particular Easter season (2020) we are experiencing a global pandemic that reminds us of our common human nature, and all of the vulnerabilities and limits of being a creature. In this context, the good news of Easter reminds us that, even though we live in the shadow of the cross where death and suffering are part of our condition, God continually renews life. These 50 days give us a time to contemplate that good news, which Jesus calls us to proclaim to all creation.

We offer this resource to our global Lutheran communion, as a way to be in the solidarity of prayer during this season of Easter. The daily prayers follow an order: Opening, Psalmody, Bible text, meditation and prayer. This order of prayer can be adapted in any way, such as singing songs, adding your own prayers, or any liturgical acts that are meaningful in your context. In addition to the texts, which follow the Revised Common Lectionary, you will notice that the Sunday meditations relate to a common theme of Baptism. Baptism is a sacrament where we receive the promise of this good news. And the Small Catechism encourages us to remember our baptism daily, as a way to be renewed by this promise each day.

We commend these prayers to your use, whether alone in your home, as a family, or as your community is able to virtually gather from a distance during the season of Easter. And as you pray in solidarity with the Lutheran communion across the globe, and the communion of saints in all times and places, be encouraged by the counsel that Luther offers in his letter, *A Simple Way to Pray*:

“Never think that you are kneeling or standing alone, rather think that the whole of the Church...are standing there beside you and you are standing among them in a common, united petition which God cannot disdain. There we find God the Creator, God the Redeemer, God the Holy Spirit, that is, God who daily sanctifies us.”

Rejoice, in the good news that all creation shares in this season! Christ is risen! And with it, all creation sings hope in the promise of new life.

Seventh Sunday of Easter

Reflecting Together

John 17:1-11

After Jesus had spoken these words, he looked up to heaven and said, “Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may glorify you, since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him. And this is eternal life, that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent. I glorified you on earth by finishing the work that you gave me to do. So now, Father, glorify me in your own presence with the glory that I had in your presence before the world existed. “I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you; for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you; and they have believed that you sent me. I am asking on their behalf; I am not asking on behalf of the world, but on behalf of those whom you gave me, because they are yours. All mine are yours, and yours are mine; and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me, so that they may be one, as we are one.

As many as have been baptized into Christ, have put on Christ. Alleluia!

In this seventh and last week of the Great 50 days of Easter, we hear Christ’s prayer in the Gospel of John. This prayer prepares us to continue the proclamation and witness and service that Christ embodied. As Pentecost approaches and the church year extends into the season of the Spirit, the disciples (and all believers) find strength in this intercessory prayer of Christ for them, for the community, and for the world.

There will be many objections to the way of faith. There will be many who want to claim “God” as their own and exclude others. There will be many who believe their way of approaching God is the only way. But the prayer of Jesus shifts all these perspectives. Eternal life consists in “that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom you have sent.” Eternal life is not something we can define. It is not about fulfilling certain obligations, even good obligations, it is simply to know God, which is to know

Jesus (as we heard in John 14). Jesus reveals to us God's mercy. Jesus is God's mercy. This is the way: mercy – or as Luther writes, “immeasurable goodness.” Immersed in God's mercy is eternal life.

On 27 March, during a special sermon and prayer for deliverance from the current pandemic, Pope Francis encouraged all believers to hear these words of Jesus “that they may be one, as we are one” (John17:11) as evoking our deep communal humanity: “our belonging as brothers and sisters.” Let us also engage continually in this prayer of Jesus and see in one another, in our neighbor, both familiar and unfamiliar, both friend and stranger, our communal bond, our responsibility for each other. And let us practice being one.

Let us pray...

God of the cosmos, we thank you for making yourself known to us in the solidarity of your Word and flesh. In the unity of the Holy Trinity, we know life-giving love. Nurture our unity, that the world may believe in your love, and live. Amen.

Our Father in heaven ...

Let us bless the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

The Lord bless us and direct our days and our deeds in peace.

Reflecting Together
